Don't miss his exciting explanation on Navigation techniques that have been utilized over time.



Reserve Current Events

The end of this month has consisted of the start of some interesting field work known as Coastal Assessment.

The Coastal Assessment project is a collaboration of research between the Rutgers Institute of

The Arabella.

Marine and Coastal Sciences (IMCS), the NJDEP, and the EPA.

The crew consists of RUMFS, JC NERR, DEP, and EPA researchers and volunteers.

The project looks at benthic (or to put plainly, sea floor) samples near sewer outflows all along the New Jersey coastline. How healthy the samples are can act as an indicator of how well we are

managing our coastline.

This year the Arabella (RUMFS offshore vessel) has taken the Coastal Assessment crew up the southern end of the New Jersey Coast and currently the crew is in a holding pattern to finish up the northern sites (over 100 sites total) once the rainy, windy, high swells and all around bad weather passes. We wish them all luck!
