
system. Students showed a great interest in the preserved eels on display

Ocean Champion Volunteer of Year

The JC NERR fondly congratulates our exceptional volunteer member, Steve Zeck, for receiving the Monmouth University Urban Coast Institute's Volunteer of the Year Award for 2010.

Since Steve started at the Reserve in 2004 his efforts to help with events, and particularly the research at the Rutgers University Marine Field Station has been invaluable. Steve has helped track dolphins offshore, driving small vessels in less than ideal conditions; has stayed up long hours into the night to help with

bridgenet samples and counting larval fish; has participated in fish tracking and tagging; has participated in the offshore Coastal Assessment Project; has helped with the standard Long Term Otter Trawls, and has made himself a reliable and lasting presence at RUMFS. Steve has been such an integral part of the Station that he also attends meetings and is a member of the local chapter of the American Fisheries Society.

Logging easily over 1,000hrs since he first started Steve's hard work and dedication make it no

surprise that he is being recognized for such an honor by the esteemed Institute.

The Awards Ceremony will be held at the Urban Coast Institute on Friday, October 29th. Awards will also be handed out for Coastal and Ocean Leadership and Marine Educator of the Year. A special luncheon will follow the Awards to honor its recipients. Congratulations again to Steve Zeck, his efforts have truly reflected the title Volunteer of the Year.
